New Child Care Setting Practice Standards

Last week the government announced plans to reopen businesses in BC that had closed due to COVID-19. Minister of State for Child Care Katrina Chen reiterated that child care centres are not mandated to reopen and can make that decision for themselves while following updated <u>health and</u> <u>safety guidelines from the Ministry of Health</u>.

Updated: TEF Guidelines

We have updated our guidelines for the province's <u>Temporary Emergency Fund</u> to provide further clarity to how the funds are expected to be used and more information to help determine eligibility requirements and deployment alongside the Affordable Child Benefit (ACCB) and other funding mechanisms.

For example, TEF is not to be used for profit purposes or to pay off debts incurred prior to the COVID-19 pandemic, where these are not necessary to keep the facility open and operating during the pandemic. However, TEF can be used by child care centres to create a wage top up for staff members such as ECE's who continue to work.

There have also been slight changes to the tiers of who qualifies as a child of an essential service worker (ESW), and more details regarding refunds and future credits.

Extension of ECE Certificates

To support our registrants during the ongoing pandemic and provide more time to meet certification requirements, we have <u>amended the Child Care</u> <u>Licensing Regulation (CCLR)</u> to give those with a 5year certificate an extra year of eligibility and oneyear certificate holders an automatic extension.

This temporary amendment applies to 5-year certificates set to expire between May 7-Dec. 31, 2020 and valid ECE-One-Year certificates that were issued or renewed in 2019. Expired certificates will not be eligible for this extension.
